The forests and massive valleys of Lassen National Park are equally beautiful. If you are ever looking for a new area to explore, check out Plumas County, CA. Also (shameless plug) if you find yourself in that area and want to catch a ton of trout, let me know and I can put you in touch with my good friend, Grant, who (lucky for me) is a fishing guide.

#### At Camp

#### CARETAKER JOE LEAVES THE COAT AT HOME

We were treated to another month of above average temperatures here in Lake Nebagamon this November. Though we did have about six inches of snow throughout the month, the mercury rose high enough after each snowfall that we ended the month with merely a trace of snow on the ground. With only the occasional dip into normal temperatures, overall we spent the month 10-20 degrees above average. We did come close to an early

start to winter in the second week of the month when a storm blew in, but the temperatures managed to stay above freezing and instead of repeating last year's early November storm, with 15 inches of snow and 20 degrees below average after it passed, this year's early November storm brought us two inches of rain and temps 20 degrees above average after the storm. At the end of the month temperatures have finally fallen back to normal with day time highs hovering around freezing and night time lows in the mid-teens. With the warm temperatures, the lake has remained ice free all month and has just started to show a bit of shore ice in the last few days. Believe it or not, there are still a few hardy souls venturing out on the lake in their fishing boats enjoying the last open water fishing of the season. Though their ride to the favorite spot on the lake must have been an experiment in the science of the wind-chill factor, I'm sure the anglers on board were treated to some fine late season open water fishing upon reaching their destination. It was strange to hear boat traffic on the lake on some of those 20 degree mornings late in November!

Around camp we were glad for the warmer than usual weather because (and I can testify to the fact) pushing around a 200 pound leaf blower is much more pleasant when the temperature is in the mid-50s, the sun is shining bright, and you only need to wear a light jacket than it is in the usual mid-20s, gray skies overhead, and all bundled up with freezing feet. The wood splitting week that followed the culmination of leaf blowing was about as pleasant as it gets and many of those days saw us shedding our layers before noon. To our surprise, much of the wood splitting chore was accomplished with us in our t-shirts! (Wearing only a t-shirt outdoors in November is a big deal for us living this far north.) With the CNOC wood piles filled and the temps still riding high, we were able to continue to pursue out-of-the-shop work around camp. I was able to get the Bike Shack and Art Shop lights converted to new power saving bulbs with safer covered fixtures, and modernized some of the wiring in the Art Shop. Caretakers Andy and Jack had time to upgrade the tripping program's tent drying "clothesline" in the side yard of the Big House. They replaced the flimsy poles with giant 6X6 poles and replaced all of the aluminum lines with heavy gauge double stranded galvanized steel wire. It turns out that Caretaker Andy is a rather lucky man in that he dodged what could have been a rather serious eye injury! He was stringing one of the new lines when it spun out of his control. The end of the wire managed to get under his safety glasses sending them flying and left Andy with a welt under his eye and a slight nick in his eyeball! After a visit to an eye specialist and 15 minutes of cleaning dirt and galvanized wire tip debris out of his eye, the ophthalmologist declared him one lucky fellow and sent him home with some antibiotic salve for his eye and a prognosis of full recovery and no permanent damage!! Back on the horse that whipped him the very next day, Caretaker Andy, upgraded with heavy duty, strap-on safety goggles, finished stringing the rest of the lines.

Hoping for a "back to normal" December filled with cold, snow and skiing, it's Caretaker Joe at camp.
