Caretaker Joe Needs a Tow

This winter's record setting El Niño event has wreaked havoc on our winter here in the far northern reaches of Wisconsin. The last weekend of January saw temperatures hit the lower 40s, and February only had one week of normal temperatures! The first weekend of the month brought temps in the mid 30s, the third weekend of the month brought temps in the 40s and the last weekend of the month bumped the 50 degree mark. It was kind of odd though because the



midweeks all had days that were at or near normal; it was just the weekends that saw the much higher temperatures. All of this up and down weather has left us with a lot of icy sidewalks, deeply rutted roads, horrible ski trail conditions and very iffy ice conditions out on the lake. The only saving grace is that the forecast is calling for a very warm March, and with any luck this wimpy winter will end soon!

You may recall in last month's article that it wasn't until the first week of January that we even had enough snow to groom the ski trails at camp. Well the melt down at the end of January almost put an end to the ski season, but a small snowstorm and a brief return to cool temps managed to extend the season for another week. After the warm weekend the first week of February though, the areas of trail under tree cover became so icy, that I thought I would try grooming out on the lake where it looked like the snow survived a bit better. Though it appeared that the lake was still sporting six to eight inches of snow after the warm weekend, below the snow were patches of two to four inches of standing water! I was able to get about 50 yards down the shore towards the waterski dock when my snowmobile and grooming sled hit the first patch of water-concealing snow, and within five yards my machine and I came to a rather wet end to our ride. Luckily I was only 30 feet or so away from the one plowed and maintained ice road on the lake this year, and with the help of my friend, Tony, and a good samaritan in a plow truck, we were able to pull the machine out of the center of what turned out to be a 50 foot puddle on top of the ice. Talking to the plow man revealed that the puddle I had happened into just off the beach of camp was one of several spots on the lake that had snow-hidden water. Further discussion revealed that the ice depth was not consistent either, with thickness ranging from eight to twelve inches, which was well below the average of 20 or more inches this late in the winter. With the lake a mess and most of the trails through camp thin and iced over, I hung the grooming sled up in the three car garage for the year and thus ended a short five week ski season at camp, one of the worst since I started grooming trails here some ten or so years ago.

In the shop, the weather has been a consistent 65 degrees all winter long and we have been making good headway on all of the repairs we had collected up in the Wanegan for the winter. I built seven new tables for the Axeman porch of the Rec-Hall; they are the same style as those on the Lumberjack porch and will replace the nearly destroyed folding tables. Ironically I refurbished those same folding tables some 15 years ago with new tops and edge banding. Currently, Caretaker Andy and I are pushing hard to get the Wanegan emptied of its worn, broken and peeling camp accoutrements, so if the early spring predictions come true, we will be ready to tackle the many outdoor projects that await us.

Giving up on this El Niño winter and hoping for an early spring, it's Caretaker Joe At Camp.
