#### CARETAKER JOE GROOMS THE TRAIL

Though the temperature logs for the month show barely a taste of winter, two key things did take place this December indicating that winter has come to the north woods of Wisconsin. First, our beloved lake has frozen over solidly once again, and, secondly, the cross country ski season has begun!



Even with two of the four weeks of the month experiencing high temperatures in the mid- and upper-thirties, Lake Nebagamon did manage to freeze over on the 10<sup>th</sup> of December. This is only two days later than it froze back in 1948, the first year Ice On/Ice Off records were recorded locally. It is a very interesting record sheet to peruse. (It's behind the office door in "A Man's Land" if you're interested.) For instance, in the first 12 years of record keeping (1948-1959), the lake froze over in November for 11 of them. Three other interesting observations I gleaned from the Ice on/Ice Off log are: the earliest ever ice-over was on Nov 7<sup>th</sup>, 1975 at -8 degrees; the latest ever ice-over was on Dec 27<sup>th</sup>, 2015 at 14 degrees; and the overall average ice-over date has shifted from mid - late November to late November - early December over the last 68years.

And even though the highest temperature for the month came as late as Dec 26th and reached 39 degrees, the Camp Nebagamon Bike Trail (CNBT) has made its annual conversion into the Camp Nebagamon Ski Trail (CNST). With cold temperatures early in the month, and a five inch snowfall on the 8th, it looked like the CNST would open early, but the temps turned bitter the following week and no more snow fell. It wasn't until Dec 19th that ample snow had accumulated for the first trail grooming of the year. At this point in the article, I am excited to report that "The Miracle on Snow," my 1974 Artic Cat Pantera, started again with only 17 pulls of its starter cord, for its 43rd winter season!! With the Cat roaring and my 2<sup>nd</sup> generation "Small Sled, Cross Country Ski Trail Groomer" attached, the CNST groomed into decent early season tracks. Unfortunately, I was able to ski them only twice before the temperature soared to 37 degrees on Dec 22<sup>nd</sup>. The weather stayed warm until the 26<sup>th</sup>, and with a Christmas Day rain/ice storm event, I thought the ski season was over before it got started. Luckily, the temps fell as fast on the 28th as they had risen on the 22nd, and with consistent flurries the last four days of the month, the CNST is open once again. The tracks are shallow and the base is very hard, but with just a few icy patches to contend with (I had a few uncharacteristic falls) I was able to take my annual New Year's Eve sunset ski. It was a delightful six kilometer ski tour through camp, and there were just enough clouds in the sky that the sunset colors were spectacular as I glided through the Axemen Village!

No matter the undulations that the mercury went through this December, no matter the snow gain, which was lost and then gained again, no matter that Christmas day at my mom's was spent in awe over the torrential rains that were falling throughout the day, winter has somehow managed to come to the northland. And, with just enough snow to ski the CNST and more in the forecast, and with the Green Bay Packers able to win the NFC North, leaving us cheese heads with just enough hope that they have what it takes to go all of the way this January, it's starting to show the signs of a great winter after all!!
