Pre-camp is just like camp, except it isn't. Pre-camp is labor. The docks go in, the grass gets mowed, the cabins get cleaned. Pre-camp is quiet. A place normally humming with the excitement of a few hundred people echoes with the intermittent shouts of a dedicated few, struggling to communicate over expanses of empty lake, or with Fornear as he jovially drives in concentric circles on his favorite John Deere mower. Camp's director Adam Kaplan roams the Big House, failing to conceal his cabin fever as he takes care of last minute staffing needs and teases us in his uniquely affectionate manner, seemingly blowing off a little steam before he assumes the role of Camp Co-Director. Outside, the normally subtle and reserved Andy Mack assumes the role of pre-camp task master, driven yet benevolent in his direction of us.

Pre-camp, however, still has the thing that makes camp especially special. It has camp people. 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PLEASE REMEMBER TO COMPLETE YOUR CAMPER FORMS!

With camp just around the corner, our office has been busy checking in forms and getting ready for the first round of campers to arrive on June 18th. Regardless of which session your child is attending at camp, please submit his required paperwork if you have not already done so.

Please make sure the following items are completed as soon as possible:

- *Cabin Preference Form: We need this information within the next few days in order to work on cabin placement before the season begins.
- *Health History Form: Parents, make sure to complete all sections of this form (including medications and vaccination records) so that we are able to accurately understand your camper's health history and prepare for his arrival. If your child needs prescription medications, please place your order with CampMeds, Inc. at www.campmeds.com. The ordering deadline is 30 days prior to your son's arrival at camp.
- *Physician's Examination Form: We need paperwork showing that your son has received a physical exam within the past 12 months. You may download our physician's examination form for your child's doctor to complete or submit a copy of similar documentation from the doctor's office. Please note that any immunization records provided by your doctor should also be entered in your son's online health history form by you.
- *Medical Treatment Authorization Form: This form MUST be signed by a parent/guardian prior to camper arrivals. A copy of his health insurance card should also be attached.
- *Objectives & Personality Form: This information helps our counselors prepare to guide your son towards completing a happy and productive summer. You may also email a more detailed letter to his counselors at info@campnebagamon.com.

Last, but not least, when you have logged in to the camper forms system, make sure YOUR contact information is up-to-date and that you have listed two emergency contacts besides a parent/guardian. You may do so by clicking on "Update Addresses/Phone Numbers" under the *Your Family* section.

At Camp

CARETAKER JOE GOES "GA GA"

The month of May at camp is always a time of mixed emotions for us caretakers. A blend of anxiety and excitement over the fast-approaching camp season starts to set in at the start of the month and continues to build as June approaches. Luckily, as the jobs get finished and are crossed off the list, the anxiety diminishes and the excitement grows. I'm sure it is much the same for many of you campers as your school year winds down and your preparations for the upcoming camp season intensify. With each final test and project at school that gets crossed off your list, your anxiety starts to drop away and with each camp form sent in and each pre-camp requirement fulfilled, your excitement grows a bit.



This spring has been a bit more intense for us, doing a number of jobs that took a lot longer than anticipated. There was the bathroom remodel at Q's corner taking twice as long as anticipated, as I described in last month's article, and a lot of "out of our hands" issues that are dependent on the actions of others to get finished. Two jobs that have us concerned at the moment are the rebuilding of the Swamper push shack, and the finishing of the new refrigerator install in the Rec Hall. The push shack job had to be contracted out, due to the insurance company's requirement in order for the claim to be filled. (If we could have done it in-house, we would have done that job last fall.) You adults can just imagine how hard it is to get a contractor to put a 10 foot by 20 foot "push shack" at the top of their priority list over finishing up 6 months' work on a \$200,000 home. You can imagine our relief when the contractor finally showed up on May 28th to start the demolition part of the project. My anxiety returned quickly when I asked him where the rest of his crew was and he informed me that he would be starting the job alone, as his crew scrambled to finish the aforementioned house build. Now I'm starting to worry that he won't leave enough time for us to put the final touches we will need to do to get the push shack ready for the season. The new refrigerator install has been plagued by the ever-present problem we have here of fitting new things of modern design into old buildings. And I can tell you that after 86 seasons of serving camp's culinary needs, the Rec Hall has gone through a lot of additions and "settling" that make installing a large perfect rectangle a real challenge. But our anxiety over that job diminished 90% last week, as all but a few of the jobs it required got wrapped up, and the last 10% will go as soon as the contractor performing the refrigeration equipment install shows up to do his part. We have a long history with this serviceman and he has never left us hanging, so I think we can safely downgrade that anxiety to 5%.

Things on the excitement scale have definitely improved with the start of the pre-camp crew on Wednesday May 27th. With each dramatic transformation of the waterfront, as the docks and rafts get put in, the excitement builds. We always start to breathe easier when the crew arrives and we remember that we have help for a couple of weeks with all of the grass mowing and other important but minor chores that we don't seem to have time to get to. Every year after the crew puts in its first week, I realize that we are going to make it! And that is when I really start to get excited to see all of the bright eager faces of the new and returning campers, and know that all of the hard work we put in over the off-season to maintain and improve our beloved Camp Nebagamon was worth it!

IMPORTANT INFORMATION REGARDING CAMPER LUGGAGE AND TRAVEL

LUGGAGE TAGS:

These should be firmly attached to every bag a camper brings with him, whether it is being checked in, carried on an airplane, or taken on the Chicago bus. This applies to everyone, regardless of airline or travel arrangements to camp. It is important that we, and airline personnel, are able to identify **all baggage** by the **yellow Camp Nebagamon tags**.



DUFFEL BAGS/LUGGAGE:

ALL Airlines: Please pre-pay baggage fees for your son's return flight. This has changed from recent years and now **includes Delta Airlines**. (Please note that if for some reason the airline does not allow you to pre-pay, we will pay the fees on the return trip and charge your son's spending money account.)

If you need to **ship** bags to camp, please notify Briggs ahead of time and send them at least one week prior to your son's arrival at camp. Camp's physical address (needed for any UPS/FedEx deliveries) is **11454 Camp Nebagamon Dr, Lake Nebagamon, WI 54849**. Please note that if you also want the luggage shipped home at the end of the camp season, it is simplest for our office (and our local UPS & FedEx drivers) if you can mail to Briggs's attention at camp (briggs@campnebagamon.com) completed FedEx/UPS tags or forms. (*Please note that due to limited storage space at camp, and our arrangement with the MSP airport, we do urge you to check bags on the trip home if possible, especially on Delta Airlines.)*

CAMPERS TRAVELING VIA AIRPLANE:

If you are booking your tickets through our travel agent, Travel One, any questions about airline tickets should be directed to Travel One at 800-245-1111. Ask for Heidi Beyer or Sonni Banks. Travel One issues electronic tickets for each camper, so do not worry about receiving a paper ticket for your child. If you are arranging travel independently, please submit the information via the online transportation form or email the itinerary to briggs@campnebagamon.com.


Looking forward to an amazing two months of experiences, laughs, challenges, and learning with all of them... and so many more. Here we go!!!
