(I was truly flattered that these boys travelled such a distance just to spend a couple of hours with me...but, as ever, my delusions of grandeur were proven out as they all but completely ignored me in favor of each other....and one of them was my own son!) Additionally, at the Chicago reunion, we were treated to a former camper from the 1940s that had not been to camp or to a reunion in MANY years...he went on to sign up for Family Camp this year! I was thrilled to see my very first counselor at Nebagamon from 38 years ago (the moment he entered the building he was placed under a strict gag order restricting him from discussing what kind of camper I was) as well as several of my own cabinmates from my camper years. The Chicago reunion is also replete with annual cabin reunions of friendships that were forged at camp decades ago. To watch these grown men interact with each other as though they were still little boys in the North Woods is truly an incredible sight. And, oh yes, there are always doughnuts at the Chicago reunion. Win-Win!

Minneapolis: This reunion begins every year with a wonderful dinner put together by our reunion host. This is a noholds-barred meal complete with enough food to make a Rec Hall meal seem as meager as the portions doled out to competitors on Survivor. (Our host is so kind as to include some incredible flank steak as she is aware of the fact that I live in a house filled with multiple vegetarians!) The adjectives were perfect. The first boy, a recently graduated camper, used words like "insane, hilarious, nuts," (which were pretty charming and certainly reflected part of what makes camp so much fun) and when he got to "wrestling on boats," I decided that our prospective parent had heard just about enough descriptors from this particular child! (I immediately placed a call to the head of sailing that year... he is looking for summer work!) We travelled around the room sharing words that truly captured what camp was all about: friendship, growth, wilderness, laughter. The reason that we all chose to gather in this living room together on a Tuesday night in January was captured beautifully by another recent camper graduate who said simply, "Brotherhood." That's right... that's it... perfect. The prospective father called me yesterday... he's in.

So Tuesday, I will hit the road again for the California swing of the roadshow. I am looking forward to another great ten days of connecting with alumni, current campers, staff members and prospective families. (Feel free to spread the word so that they know I will be in town!) Then, later in the month, I will be off to Colorado, Texas, Oklahoma, and Arizona. Lots of miles, lots of reunions...lots of Brotherhood. 

CARETAKER JOE WORKS AWAY

Through my many years as a caretaker, I have often had camp alumni tell me how envious they are of our jobs as caretakers at camp. They often remark on how nice it must be working outdoors, surrounded by all of the beautiful trees on the shore of one of the most beautiful lakes in the area. I usually agree that our location does have its perks, but work is work no matter where you are. It's true that on those perfect weather days when the grass needs mowing there is no better place to be than on the riding mower with good tunes on the pod, and a delightful breeze blowing out of the southwest, with a 75 degree temp and clear blue sky overhead. I can see how someone, spending their work day in an office cubicle assembling a report on how the five-cent-per-unit price increase



of a key component in the widget they manufacture is going to affect the unit price of said widget, and thus what effect that will have on next quarter's profit forecast – that person might be a bit envious of the glorified version of what life would be like if one was a caretaker at a boys' camp. As I went through my days at work this month I thought often about those envious alums; would they still feel that a camp caretaker has such a great gig, if they were here in my shoes at the heart of the winter with no grass in sight (and barely any snow either), the lake frozen solid, the average temperature in the low 20s, a seemingly endless string of dreary gray days, and a sharp cold wind blowing steadily out of the northeast? Would the job still seem quite as idyllic as they went through the tedious procedure to rehab a cabin blind for the 30th time knowing that they had 30 more to go after working at the same task for nearly a month already, and that you did the identical thing the previous two winters for about the same amount of time to about the same number of blinds, with the only upside being that you know that this will be the last of it (this being the last of the four villages needing blind overhauls)?

I'll admit that I to have often had "the grass is greener" moments (quite a few actually while working through the blind rehab project). I often think about what a great life this or that "other" job would bring. I was listening to an author on NPR the other day describe all of the great fun she had researching her topic, months spent traveling to different parts of the country to access various archives and historical collections. I started to think while mired in my tedious but necessary task, how envious I was of someone who had such a great job! But then she started to talk about how that part of the job amounted to less than half of the activity of writing the book, and that the real work got started when she had to go through the slog of turning all of that enjoyable researching into a good book; it was a very hard, tedious, repetitive, and quite frankly boring job to produce the actual book.

Now don't get me wrong, being a caretaker at a boys' camp can be a pretty good job: working outdoors (weather permitting), a wide variety of tasks, eight weeks of the year surrounded by excited kids having a great summer, ten weeks of the year being part of a team filled with energetic ideal-driven young adults who are facilitating that great summer experience, and 52 weeks of the year being a member of the six person team that makes the whole deal possible at all! But as I stated earlier, work is work no matter where you are! No matter what you are working at there are good and bad aspects, easy and hard parts, interesting and dull moments, exhilarating and frustrating days; the only constant in work is you and what you bring to it.

Looking forward to seeing the last of the rehabbed blinds back in the Axeman Village, it's Caretaker Joe At Camp.
