<u>At Camp</u>

CARETAKER JOE GROOMS THE TRAIL

Although we started the month off with no snow on the ground, open water on the lake, and temperatures well above average, by the time the Winter Solstice arrived there was 10 inches of snow, the lake was iced over, and temperatures had fallen below normal.

Caretaker Andy and I were just finishing splitting the wood pile on the warm 46-degree afternoon of Monday December 4th when the weather turned first to rain and then to snow as the temperature plummeted to 16 degrees by the next morning. Unfortunately, the storm put out more rain overnight than originally forecast and we awoke to only three inches of snow on top of a very thick coating of ice. The cold and snow have persisted for the rest of the month with only one additional day above the freezing mark; the snow has accumulated to a well settled 10-inch base. That was just enough for me to get out the "Miracle on Snow", my 1975 Artic Cat Pantera snowmobile! Once again the "Miracle on Snow" came to life for its 43rd season, with only a little sandpaper buff on its spark plugs, and 15 pulls of the starter rope. I attached the ski trail groomer and together we made this winter's conversion of the Camp Nebagamon Bike Trail (CNBT) into the CNBT into the CNST and with loops through the Axmen village and the Homes on the Range was able to groom a 4.5 mile ribbon of single track through camp. I've been able to ski the track several times since and though it is a bit thin in spots things are in good shape for the coming winter holiday break.

With all of the early cold in October and at the start of November the lake came close to freezing over four times but with each successive warm up and several days of blasting winds the forming ice broke up. Finally, on December 9th, with a windless night and a low of 16 degrees, the lake iced over for good. Looking through the ice-on/ice-off record that dates back to 1948, the most common dates for ice to form are in mid-to-late November, but in the past decade dates in early December are becoming more common. The latest ever recorded ice-on was December 27th in 2015, and the earliest recorded freeze over was on November 7, 1991, with a -8-degree morning!

With last Spring's early ice-off date of April 4th, this was the second longest ice-free season recorded with 248 days. The record longest ice-free season occurred in 2015 with 260 days. With the return of the cold and snow outside, Caretaker Andy and I have moved into the shop for the winter. Andy set to work building a bankers box shelving unit for the financial records store room on the third floor of the big house. He built the unit in modules in the warmth of the shop and then assembled the finished shelving unit in the frigid cold of the unheated Big House. I continued to endure the cold on the Axmen porch of the Rec-Hall for a few days to help prepare for installing a new walk-in freezer in the Spring. I stripped the old Rec-Hall freezer walls apart to re-claim the recyclable material from them and was able to get a truck load of sheet steel and a truck load of sheet aluminum separated and sent to the scraper. After that job, I had had enough of the cold and moved into the shop where I got busy re-designing camps ultra-comfortable single seat Adirondack chair into a "rocking" Adirondack chair. The new rocking design was an awesome success and I proceeded to make two of the chairs that will go into the remodeled Kozy Corner staff lounge next spring.

Looking forward to a lot of "skinny skiing" over the week long holiday break, it's Caretaker Joe At Camp.

The Camp Family Remembers

The camp family lost a giant last month in the passing of Ed Drolson. The following is a remembrance of Ed written by Sally Lorber Stein.

To most camp alumni, 54849 means camp. For Ed Drolson, it also meant his hometown. I always felt that the Drolson family, especially Eddie, bridged whatever gap there might have been between the village and camp. Ed's parents, Ludy and Evelyn, met on the Big House steps, and Ludy was the postmaster of Lake Nebagamon for many years. The Drolsons were the first to invite the Lorbers into their home—and I remember musical evenings there, with each Drolson playing an instrument or singing. Ed and I were buddies. We learned to walk on stilts together (I have the picture to prove it). At Friday night roller skating in the village auditorium it was a treat to watch Eddie, the picture of grace, gliding in perfect timing to the music. He also was a great dancer (I loved to dance the polka with Ed). In 1953, Ed started what would be a 20-year run on the staff. He was a senior counselor, then a village push (Swamper and Axeman), and he finished his career at CNOC. One of the highlights for Ed was being chosen to be a counselor on camp's See America Trip, and he reflected on that adventure throughout his life."

"Ed and his family were at Nardie's and my wedding—in fact his mother played the music. Then we welcomed Luise into our lives, just as Ed had welcomed Nardie, and the four of us were firm friends. Ed and Luise were fine parents who adored their children, Paul and Paula, and relished their time with their grandchildren. Ed was a fine and respected teacher. He liked helping children, as he did, winter and summer. He met people easily and readily made them feel welcome. He had courage, wit, and a fun sense of humor—and he loved telling tales of his early counseling years. Even after retirement, Ed relished any contact he had with camp, enjoyed coming to barbecues, and welcomed each new set of directors. Walking the grounds of camp at the beginning and end of each summer filled him with joy. Ed Drolson is gone and the village grieves with us. There is a hole in the atmosphere at 54849."
