Your donation to the Camp Nebagamon Scholarship Fund helps children and teens who experience poverty and disability attend non-profit summer camps that specialize in meeting their needs. Children at CNSF-supported camps are among peers as they enjoy friendship, adventure, and personal growth – opening new possibilities for a more positive future.

CNSF was founded in 1947 by Muggs and Janet Lorber, Nebagamon’s founding directors, and administered for 50+ years by Nebagamon’s former directors, Nardie and Sally Lorber Stein.

Offers experiences that ignite curiosity, create connections, and grow confidence.
<b><u>Camp Courageous</u></b> Iowa & surrounding states	100% have intellectual and physical challenges, and 75% receive means-tested tuition assistance	Provides adaptive recreation, social and adventure experiences for children with intellectual and physical disabilities.
<b><u>The Fowler Center</u></b> Michigan region <i>Methodist Children’s Home Society</i>	100% have intellectual and physical challenges, and 70% from low-income households	Offers accessible recreation to meet the physical, intellectual, emotional and motivational needs of children with intellectual and physical disabilities.
<b><u>Camp Helen Brachman</u></b> Milwaukee area <i>COA Youth &amp; Family Centers</i>	99% from low-income households	Provides supportive outdoor recreation plus programs to strengthen literacy and spur healthy physical, nutritional, social and emotional choices.
<b><u>Camp Joy</u></b> Cincinnati region <i>United Way of Greater Cincinnati</i> <i>United Way of Warren County</i> <i>United Way of Clinton County</i>	100% from low-income households	Offers camping for youth in foster care and other under-served communities, offers skill-building for leadership, teamwork, setting and achieving goals, and developing healthy relationships.
<b><u>Camp Phoenix</u></b> Memphis region <i>Boys &amp; Girls Clubs of Greater Memphis</i>	92% from low-income households	Offers recreation aligned with year-round Boys & Girls Club programs that support educational and professional outcome goals.
<b><u>Camp Summit</u></b> Dallas-Fort Worth area & beyond	100% have intellectual and physical challenges, 90% receive means-tested tuition assistance	Focuses on campers’ abilities, not disabilities, offers a barrier-free, joyful environment with specialized equipment and trained staff.

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<u><b>Camp Twin Lakes</b></u> Atlanta and Southeast U.S. region	3 camp sites serve 60 partner organizations, CNSF supports 100% disability camps	Offers fully adaptive camp activities with a focus on learning new skills, nurturing community and achieving personal growth.
<u><b>Camp Wawbeek</b></u> Wisconsin plus adjacent states <i>Easter Seal Society of Wisconsin</i>	99% have intellectual and physical challenges, 75% from low-income households	Focuses on meeting individual needs for personal care, emotional, behavioral and social support. Offers adaptive accessible recreation, and focuses on helping individuals overcome challenges.
<u><b>Happy Hollow Camp</b></u> Indianapolis area <i>United Way of Central Indiana</i>	93% from low-income households	Develops problem-solving skills, self-sufficiency, teamwork, leadership and decision-making capabilities. Supports positive behaviors and social skills.
<u><b>Sherwood Forest</b></u> St Louis region <i>United Way of Greater St Louis</i>	80% from low-income households, and 15% have intellectual and physical challenges	Provides an active learning environment that reinforces healthy risk-taking, problem-solving, teamwork, and character development. Builds skills and enthusiasm for reading, math and STEM: alumni break the cycle of poverty.
<u><b>Wyman Leaders</b></u> St Louis area	100% from low-income households	Offers 21-day summer experience for 9 <sup>th</sup> and 10 <sup>th</sup> graders as part of a 9-year program from 9 <sup>th</sup> grade through four-year postsecondary education. Supports, inspires and empowers teens to break the cycle of poverty as adults.
